There are many special days or celebrations about the moon for different people around the world. The most famous one is the Moon Festival of the Chinese.

Passover is an eight day springtime holidays for <u>Jewish</u> people during the first full moon of "Nissan," the Jewish calendar. It celebrates God saving them from <u>slavery</u> thousands of years ago.

For the **Buddhist**, there are several celebrations on the full moon days in a year. The Buddhist in Thailand, Burma, Sri Lanka, Cambodia and Lao, the New Year keeps 3 days from the first full moon day in April. Every May on the night of the full moon, they celebrate the birth of the Buddha over 2,500 years. In India, this celebration for Buddha's birthday is called "Vesak", the name of the month in the Indian calendar.

Kandy is a beautiful city in Sri Lanka. A great <u>temple</u> is on a small hill there. People say one Buddha's tooth is inside the temple. Once a year in August, on the night of the full moon, people get together on the hill for the Festival of the Tooth.

The Loy Krathong Festival, Festival of Floating Bowls, falls on the full moon night of the twelfth lunar month in Thailand. People bring bowls made of leaves, containing flowers, candles and <u>incense</u> sticks, and float them in the water. As <u>they</u> go, all bad luck is supposed to disappear.
